Double Kitchen Islands

The kitchen has always been the most social space in a home. With new "working from home" habits for adults and kids needing a place to work on their school assignments, having double the surface area is an understated luxury that has become indispensable in the past five years. Plus, adding the second island frees the original one up to use for its original intended purpose—cooking.

The height of the second island can be a lower seated table or an elevated surface, which creates a more casual seating option by nature of it being a bar-top height. Seating around the island can be limited to just one or two sides or can expand to offer seating all the way around.






The Emergence of the Back Kitchen
